

#### **Perspective Plan**

- 1. Opening of Online Free Access Repository comprising of Primary Texts and SecondaryReferences, Class Notes and faculty's publications in non-editable format as a resourcebank for present and future references and study.
- 2. Organising National Seminars and Students Seminar on issues of Feminism, Human Rights which are newly introduced in CBCS syllabi.
- 3. Engage in collaborative academic ventures with other institutions like joint publication of ISBN books or journals, organizing seminars, invited lectures and preparing coursemodules.
- 4. Motivating faculty members to pursue research and publication, participating in seminars, workshops, faculty development programs, orientation and refresher courseswhich will enhance their teaching skills and their research acumen.
- 5. In addition to maintain the regular routine classes, remedial classes must be arranged for both weaker and advanced students in covering their lacuna for examinations.
- 6. Emphasis must be laid on ICT enabled teaching and use of multi-modal facilities for making teaching-learning experiences exciting and impactful.
- 7. Encouraging cultural events organized by students to showcase their extracurricular talents involving performing arts.
- 8. Arranging classes on basic computer skills consisting of Microsoft Paint, Word, Exceland PowerPoint, Email, Pdf making and Scan.
- 9. Initiating Mentor-Mentee system for better feedback, counselling and guidance of students.
- 10. A certificate course will be open in Yoga and Meditation for students.
